



Day 4	hike in the Punta Suarez area, a naturalist's paradise, explore Gardner Bay and its white sandy beach
Day 5	hike to Punta Cormorant and Champion, explore Post Office and its snorkeling opportunities
Day 6	admire different kind of birds while at the Highlands Tortoise Reserve
Day 7	hike to find land iguanas and birds, afternoon to hike and snorkel
Day 8	optional hike or snorkel, explore the lava flows, farewell dinner

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DAY 1 Tuesday 3/18/25

Arrive Guayaquil

They will help make your experience a fun and personally fulfilling adventure and will cheer you on as you reach beyond your comfort zone and embrace new challenges!

Arrival Information

Arrive in Guayaquil, Ecuador (GYE) any time today.

Shuttle to the Hotel

Take the hotel shuttle to the Wyndham Guayaquil, Puerto Santa Ana. Look for your name on a sign.

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DAY 2 Wednesday 3/19/25

Guayaquil to the Galápagos

Never connected to the mainland of South America, the Galápagos Islands were formed entirely through volcanic activity. Eruptions here can be almost annual, with the majority of volcanic activity being in the younger, westerly islands.

Morning Flight to San Cristobal

Meet your group early in the morning (be packed and ready to go!) and head to the airport for your flight to San Cristobal in the Galápagos Islands.

Transfer to Your Yacht

Upon arrival, you'll be met by your guide at the airport and transferred to the dock where you will board your yacht.

Boat Orientation

You'll be given some information about the yacht, your home for the next week. The crew will show you to your cabin before lunch.

Explore the Interpretation Center

The interpretation center provides a wealth of captivating information, delivering a comprehensive overview of the formation of the Galapagos, its global significance, and the challenges and conservation endeavors it faces.

Subsequently, a hike to Frigatebird Hill (Cerro Tijeretas) offers a splendid opportunity to observe both species of

frigatebirds, accompanied by a bonus of a breathtaking view of the bay below.

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DAY 3 Thursday 3/20/25

Galápagos Islands, San Cristóbal

San Cristóbal is one of the islands in the Galápagos archipelago, a group of volcanic islands located in the Pacific Ocean about 600 miles (1,000 kilometers) off the coast of Ecuador. The islands are a UNESCO World Heritage site and a biological marine reserve, and they remain one of the world's most pristine and unique environments.

Kicker Rock and Cerro Brujo

Explore San Cristobal Island's ancient and weathered volcanic tuff lava known as Leon Dormido or Kicker Rock on San Cristobal Island. Comprising two rocks with a height of around 480 feet, it derives its name from its striking resemblance to a sleeping lion.

From our pangas, as you head to shore, you are first humbled by the immensity of the stunning cliffs of ëSorcererís Hillí. Simply enjoy sharing the beach with sea lions, snorkeling from the shore or take a walk to a hidden lagoon where we might spot black- necked stilts, ruddy turnstones, whimbrels and white-cheeked pintails.

Punta Pit

Sea lions will greet you as you land on the beach and prepare for your climb to a high point on the steep eroded tuff cone. This is the only place in the islands where you can have the chance to see all three of the booby species in the same place. The red-foots will be perched on the Cordia lutea and small trees, the Nazcaís on the ground near the cliff edge while the blue-foots will be a little further inland. Frigatebirds will be all around, and the views are breathtaking.

Galápagos Islands, Espanola Island

Espanola Island, also known as Hood Island, is one of the Galápagos Islands. Espanola is the southernmost island in the Galápagos and is known for its unique wildlife, pristine landscapes, and vibrant marine life. It is home to large colonies of marine iguanas, sea lions, and various seabird species.

Punta Suarez

One of the standout destinations on your journey, Punta Suarez on Espanola Island, offers a naturalist's paradise with a rich array of experiences. Upon landing, you are welcomed by a multitude of marine iguanas and sea lions. As you venture further, your walk brings you into close encounters with boobies, endemic lizards, gulls, and a captivating blow hole. Being the oldest existing island in the archipelago, it provides a unique chance to connect with the endemic waved albatross during their breeding season, spanning from April to December. If fortunate, you may witness their intricate courtship display.

Gardner Bay

Among the most breathtaking beaches in the entire Galapagos, this expansive stretch of long, white, sandy shoreline is gently caressed by turquoise waters. It serves as the residence for a colony of Galapagos sea lions, seemingly indifferent to the humans strolling among them. The Hood mockingbirds, exclusive to this particular island, display eagerness to inspect the visitors, satisfying their innate curiosity. Within the vibrant assembly, Darwin's finches, including the elusive warbler finch, may make an appearance. Additionally, the opportunity to snorkel is available right from the beach, exploring the shallows of the bay.

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DAY 5 Saturday 3/22/25

Galápagos Islands, Floreana Island

Floreana Island is also known as Charles Island. Located in the southern part of the Galápagos archipelago, it is the sixth-largest island in the chain. Cormorant Point and Post Office Bay are two important visitor sites on Floreana. Cormorant owes its reputation to its green-tinged beach (due to olivine crystals) while Post Office Bay is known for its wooden barrel that served as a post office for sailors.

Punta Cormorant / Champion

Make a wet landing on an olivine green-sanded beach. Your hike will take you from the black mangrove beds to a brackish lagoon, typically home to one of the largest flamingo populations in the Galapagos. The island boasts endemic plants like Scalesia villosa, white and black mangrove, and holy stick. Reach a stunning white sandy beach, a significant nesting site for Green Pacific Sea Turtles. From the beach, you can observe sea turtles, blue-footed boobies diving into the water, and small reef sharks patrolling the shoreline in search of food.

Return to the olivine beach where you initially landed. Swim or snorkel among sea turtles, reef fish, sea lions, and, on a fortunate day, white-tipped reef sharks. Floreana is also home to a small colony of penguins, occasionally visible in the surroundings.

Post Office Bay

Make a wet landing on the north side of Floreana, known as Post Office Bay. The bay earned its name in 1793 when Captain James Colnett set up a wooden barrel, serving as an informal post office for passing sailors. These sailors would take letters with them and deliver them to their destinations. Today, visitors maintain this tradition by placing unstamped postcards inside the barrel, hoping fellow travelers heading to the letter's destination will carry it for free. During your visit, you may encounter Darwin's finches, Yellow Warbler, and Lava Lizards. Snorkelers can enjoy practicing their skills on the main beach, surrounded by playful sea lions.

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DAY 6 Sunday 3/23/25

Galápagos Islands, Santa Cruz Island

Santa Cruz Island is the second-largest island in the Galápagos and is characterized by its diverse landscapes, wildlife, and visitor sites. The island is home to a variety of wildlife, including giant tortoises, marine iguanas, land iguanas, Darwin's finches, and various bird species.

Highlands Tortoise Reserve

Make a dry landing. In the Galapagos mountains, you can marvel at a diverse array of birds, including tree and ground finches, vermillion flycatchers, paint-billed crakes, yellow warblers, and cattle egrets (frequently perched on the tortoises' shells). The journey to the reserve provides excellent opportunities to witness the island's contrasts, spanning various ecosystems. The route meanders from the coastline through the agricultural zone, ascending into the lush, humid forests. Along the way, it's common to encounter Galapagos Giant Tortoises leisurely roaming through pastures in the paddocks. This location is a haven for birdwatchers, as nearly every land bird residing or migrating on the island can be found here.

During your visit, you may encounter Darwin's finches, Yellow Warbler, and Lava Lizards. The bay offers excellent snorkeling opportunities with Green Pacific Sea Turtles. Additionally, the island is renowned for its endemic vegetation, including Scalesia villosa, Lecocarpus Pinnatifidus, and the Galapagos Milkwort. Snorkelers can enjoy practicing their skills on the main beach, surrounded by playful sea lions.

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DAY 7 Monday 3/24/25

Galápagos Islands, Isabela Island

Isabela Island is located on the west of the archipelago and has one of the richest marine ecosystems. The island was formed by six volcanoes which originally were six different islands; five of the volcanoes are still active. Each one of them is populated by a different species of Tortoise that used to live on a separate island. Isabela Island offers not only diverse ecosystems but also some of the most amazing landscapes and natural sights of the archipelago.

Prince Philip's Steps

This morning, you will visit Genovesa Island where you will be marveled at the variety of sea life that uses the crevices of the lava cliffs for shelter. You will be dropped off at a steep stairway that begins on rocks at the foot of a path that leads through a seabird colony full of Nazca and Redfooted Boobies. At the plateau, the trail continues inland, allowing you to see more nesting booby colonies in the thin Palo Santo forest. Near the end of the trail, over a rocky lava plain, Wedge-rumped Storm Petrels can be observed flying in all directions.

Darwin Bay

Later today, disembark onto a small sand and coral beach where a short trail heads west along a tidal lagoon and then up a rocky hill that leads to a point overlooking the cliffs and Darwin Bay. Along the trail near the tidal lagoon, you will see pairs of Swallow-tailed and Lava Gulls, and Yellow-crowned and Lava Herons. The trail continues through Palo Santo trees which are the home of hundreds of thousands of Red-footed Boobies.

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DAY 8 Tuesday 3/25/25

Galápagos Islands, Santiago Island

Santiago Island is known for its volcanic black beach, wonderful landscapes, fur seal grottos, sea lion colonies, herons, hawks, oystercatchers, finches, doves, white-tipped sharks, and sea turtles. You can see the vegetation change from arid to humid climate zones, as well as the effect of intensive foraging by introduced goats, which have been eradicated.

Hike on Rábida Island

This island has an abundance of landscapes and marine life. The trail takes about 90 minutes to walk, and you can also go around the shoreline in a dinghy to spot fur seals, pelicans, blue-footed boobies, and Nazca boobies. This is an excellent place for swimming and snorkeling; you could see white-tipped sharks, rays, and sea lions, among many others.

Bartolome Island

This afternoon you'll have two landing possibilities: a dock and a beach. The dock, made of lava and concrete, soon turns into a wooden staircase built to avoid erosion and consists of 372 steps. It takes you to the island's summit, where you'll find Pinnacle Rock. Due to its altitude, the lack of vegetation is immediately noticeable. Pioneer plants are present and are named because they are the first to establish roots on new ground. The coralline beach next to Pinnacle Rock is a wet landing site from which you are able to snorkel amongst tropical fish and perhaps sea lions and penguins; they rest on the lava of the intertidal zone and sometimes decide to take a dip.

Farewell Dinner

Have a farewell dinner with your group to toast the end of an exceptional adventure.
